Purpose

Get you ready to crush behavioral interviews.

Overview

The rules of behavioral interviews (i.e. "Tell me about a time when...")

- 1. Never tell a story you haven't practiced
- 2. Select your stories carefully, and in advance
- 3. Always tell your highest impact stories, find a way to weave them in
- 4. Clearly articulate the Situation, Action, and Result
- 5. Keep it succinct, don't let time run away
- 6. Have a playbook so you can quickly select the best stories during an interview

The Stories

Write down your top career stories when you led a team, built something, launched something, turned a bad situation around, or generally took action to have a meaningful impact. For each story, separately describe the Situation, Action, and Result.
